
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


- Framework for a multi-use and transit corridor in the heart of the region
- Links many of Atlanta's historical landmarks and cultural destinations
- Connects four historic rail corridors





- Unites 45 neighborhoods
- 15,000 acre Planning Area includes:
  - One-mile wide area
  - 6,500 acre TAD
  - 22% of the City of Atlanta population
  - 19% of the City's land



# Private development is following public/private investment:

- Over 110 projects complete or underway within Planning Area\* valued at over \$3 billion
- 15,483 new residential units completed
- Nearly 2 million SF of new commercial space completed
- Roughly 7 to 1 return on investment through 2015
- \* Projects larger than 10 dwelling units or 10,000 square feet

# Westside Trail



- Construction is on schedule and within budget
- 3-mile trail will connect 4 schools and 4 parks
- 14 access points
- Vertical connections
- Preparation for future transit

- Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive will be closed June 11-12 for steel beam placement






## **Eastside Trail Extension**

- Construction prep began May 2016
- Timeline for completion approximately 12 months after start






## Southside Trail



- Includes 4-mile trail between University Ave & Memorial Drive
- Design to include lighting, retaining walls, vertical connections, storm drainage, signage / wayfinding, and bridges
- Federally funded project following GDOT Design Process






## Southside Trail



- Design to be complete in 18-24 months (depending on access to the corridor) followed by permitting, easement acquisition, and construction
- Design and Community
   Outreach began in spring 2016

## FHLBank Atlanta Structured Partnership

#### **Program Components**

- Downpayment
   Assistance for homes
   within the Planning Area
   (accepting applications)
- Owner Occupied Rehab (only working with 2015 applicants)

#### **Funding**

- 2:1 ABI to FHLB commitment
- 20% of purchase price

#### **Income Limits**

80% of Area Median





#### Affordable Housing: Lofts at Reynoldstown Crossing II



- Approximately1.3 acres alongMemorial Drive
- Adjacent to the Atlanta BeltLine
- ABI plans to issue a Request for Proposals in 2016
- Affordable housing is a key objective





#### Affordable Housing: Integrated Action Plan





#### **KEY STRATEGIES**

- Pursue and diversify funding sources
- Build financial sources and tools for land acquisition
- Predevelopment and sale/lease of ABI-owned land to include affordable workforce housing
- Strengthen partnerships and policy (i.e. Inclusionary Zoning)

#### **KEY PROJECTS**

- Capitalize an acquisition fund
- Directly support the creation of 3 major affordable workforce housing developments
- Implement and scale the FHLB partnership

#### Affordable Housing: Legislation





#### CITY-WIDE ORDINANCE

- Any multi-family residential property for lease that receives a grant, incentive, or subsidy in the City of Atlanta will be obligated to adhere to housing set asides:
  - EITHER 10% of units must be set aside for residents making 60% of Area Median Income (AMI) and below
  - OR 15% of units must be set aside for residents making 80% of AMI and below
- Affordable housing units must be similar in construction and appearance to regularly priced units and must be spread throughout the development, not isolated in one area



#### Affordable Housing: Reynoldstown Senior



- Mercy Housing now accepting applications
- 1 and 2 bedroom homes located 2 blocks from the Eastside Trail Extension
- Affordable rents for residents 62 years and older
- Atlanta BeltLine
   Affordable Trust Fund contributed \$1.5
   million




#### Transit: Environmental Clearance

- Atlanta Regional Commission and Invest Atlanta contributing funds






# Transit: Complete Streets


#### POTENTIAL IMPROVEMENTS

- Light rail transit, including the Atlanta BeltLine loop
- Heavy rail transit expansion
- New infill stations and station enhancements
- Multi-jurisdictional rail transit (including Clifton Corridor)
- Additional railcars
- Bus Rapid Transit, Arterial Rapid Transit Routes, and two transit centers
- More frequent bus service and community circulator service















#### PROPOSED MULTI-USE TRAILS

Forty miles, including 7 miles of completed Atlanta BeltLine trail:

- BeltLine in-corridor trails: 16 miles
  - Includes right-of-way acquisition, design, utility relocation, and construction
- Connector trails: 17 miles
  - Southwest BeltLine Connector
  - Proctor Creek Greenway
  - Pryor Street Trail
  - Murphy Avenue Spur
- Total cost estimate: \$417.9 million \*

# POTENTIAL TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS

#### Benefits of building out the Atlanta BeltLine trail network


- Completes acquisition of entire BeltLine 22 mile loop
- Prepares BeltLine corridor to be transit ready
- Builds connector trails to neighborhoods across the city
- Stimulates economic development in all segments of the BeltLine Planning Area
- Reduces cost of trail construction
- Produces equitable development of investments around city
- Leverages matching funds with public private partnerships


















# POTENTIAL TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS

- 155 unique projects
- 125 miles of projects, including:

  - Vehicular improvements
  - Neighborhood greenways
  - Complete streets
  - Multi-use trails

- Serving 96% of Atlanta residents
