
WESTSIDE BELTLINE TOUR



WESTSIDE BELTLINE TOUR

Tour Length: 10.77 miles

Begins: Lee + White (free parking is available here)

Ends: Lee + White

Begin the tour at the <u>Lee + White</u> Parking lot (1020 White St. SW, Atlanta, GA 30310) heading north on the trail.

Did you know? The West End developments (that include Lee + White) were created from what was known as Warehouse Row. The 14-building warehouse area was purchased in 2019.

Nature in the Neighborhood*:

- The Northern Cardinal, Georgia's state bird
- Ginkgo trees, characterized by their fan-shaped leaves

On the Way to Stop 2:

 Pass Malaika Favorite's mural, <u>West End Remem-</u> bers, which tells the story of Atlanta's West End.

Note: Continuing straight will be along an unpaved trail. To stay on paved trail, exit the trail at Lawton St and continue on White St to Gordon White Park.

Gordon White Park (1350 Ralph David Abernathy Blvd SW Atlanta, GA 30310)

Did you know? Constructed in 2008, Gordon White Park is the first official BeltLine park.


On the Way to Stop 3:

- "Meet Me at the Crayons" by Santiago
 Menendez-Gill (along the trail just across White
 St. from Gordon White Park)
- <u>"Transformation Tunnel"</u> by Living Walls (various artists)
- <u>"The Art of Reconciliation"</u> by William Massey (under the I-20 bridge)
- <u>"Column of Change"</u> by Tanner Coleman (at the Holderness Ave. access point)
- Washington Park (102 Ollie St NW Atlanta, GA 30314

Did you know? The Washington Park neighborhood is comprised of four subdivision plots, one of which was the first planned Black neighborhood in Atlanta, founded in the 1910s. Rev. Dr. Joseph E. Lowery Blvd was formerly known as Ashby Street, which served as a segregationist dividing line between neighborhoods. The physical park was constructed in 1919, making it the first recreational park available to Black Atlantans.

On the Way to Stop 4:

- Mozley Park
- **Just Us** is the smallest neighborhood in Atlanta.



Did you know? Westview Cemetery is the largest civilian cemetery in the southeast US, at over 580 acres. **Note:** You can't ride your bike through the cemetery, but you're welcome to walk to take a quided tour!

Nature in the Neighborhood: In the 1890s, a florist operated on the cemetery's grounds, eventually becoming the largest greenhouse operator in the southeast. The Burford Holly was discovered on the cemetery grounds in 1895 by then head gardener, Thomas Burford.

On the Way to Stop 5:

Check out the Westview Commercial District for local eats.



On the Way to Stop 6:

- Check out the <u>Aluma Farm</u>, the only working urban farm on the BeltLine.
- Murphy Crossing site of future development
- Murals and neighborhood art at Lee and Murphy St Tunnels: Professional murals on the West and art painted by kids and families during a Family Paint Day in 2017 on the East.

6 Southside Trail - Segment 1

Did you know? The Southside Trail (SST Segment 1), connects with the Westside Trail at University Ave. It opened in Sep 2021. It's a key component to connecting the east and west sides of the Atlanta BeltLine. From this point, riders can continue to the Eastside along an unpaved portion of the trail.

7 Tour ends at Lee + White.

Grab a bite or enjoy a drink at one of the great places around Lee + White.

*The BeltLine Arboretum is a living ecosystem museum from Trees Atlanta that follows along the BeltLine trails. It's also the longest linear arboretum in the world!



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
