The City of Atlanta Mayor's Office of Cultural Affairs will receive \$100,000 to advance design on the Atlanta BeltLine Reynoldstown Stage. The project to be designed with Our Town funding will combine a permanent stage structure, a landscaped exhibit space, and an elevated park connection with some of the best views in the city. It is one of 66 "Our Town" grants awarded nationally from the

National Endowment for the Arts.

The Reynoldstown Stage project site is located behind the Lofts at Reynoldstown Crossing on the Eastside Trail southern extension. The stage, exhibit space, and park, which will be designed and managed by Atlanta BeltLine, Inc., is adjacent to neighborhoods that are lacking in park space. The project seeks to design a community destination on a site with unique topography and cultural value. The proposal was based on a partnership with Georgia Tech professor Tristan Al-Haddad and his students.

"The Atlanta BeltLine is the most transformative project that this City has ever seen," said Atlanta Mayor Kasim Reed. "A grant from the National Endowment for the Arts shows once again that the Atlanta BeltLine is competing on a national level."

National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) Chairman Jane Chu announced plans to award 66 "Our Town" grants totaling \$5.073 million and reaching 38 states.

"A national conversation is taking place around how to do community development in a way that is authentic, equitable, and builds on existing assets," said Chairman Chu. "Through Our Town funding, our participation with other federal agencies in efforts such as the White House Council on Strong Cities and Strong Communities, and other projects developed by partners like ArtPlace America, artists and arts organizations will continue to mature, refine and amaze with their work to make America a better place."

This year's Our Town projects demonstrate again that excellent art is as fundamental to a community's success as land-use, transportation, education, housing, infrastructure, and public safety, helping build stronger communities that are diverse in geography and character.



ATLANTA BELTLINE LOVE GOES INTERNATIONAL

In May of this year, the Atlanta BeltLine was awarded the Grand Prize for "Best Environmental Rehabilitation Project" in the world by the International Real Estate Federation (FIABCI.) During the World Conference on Building Humanity in Luxembourg, FIABCI awarded the Atlanta BeltLine the Prix d'Excellence Award for Historic Fourth Ward Park and the Eastside Trail. Officials from FIABCI toured the winning park and trail with staff from Atlanta BeltLine, Inc. The Atlanta BeltLine qualified for the international Prix d'Excellence Award by entering the FIABCI-USA Grand Prix of Real Esate, an annual property awards program that recognizes projects that best embody excellence in all real estate disciplines. FIABCI-USA is a professional real estate organization that provides information and services to help individuals, companies, and associations expand their global networks.

This summer, the Atlanta BeltLine Westside Trail project reached a major project milestone. Working with the Georgia Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration, the City of Atlanta and a team of design and engineering consultants led by Kimley-Horn & Associates, Atlanta BeltLine, Inc. met the federal deadline of June 30 to complete final design and land acquisition for the multi-use trail in southwest Atlanta. By meeting this deadline, the \$18 million TIGER V grant for the \$43 million Westside Trail, is now secure for the project's implementation. In just nine months, ABI and its partners executed a complex process of design, land acquisition, environmental clearance and other approvals by the state and federal governments that often exceeds 24 months for projects of this magnitude.

In addition to the \$18 million TIGER V grant and \$15 million of other state and local funding, the Atlanta BeltLine Partnership is leading a \$10 million private fundraising effort.

Upon completion, the 3-mile trail will run from University Avenue in Adair Park north to Lena Street at Washington Park. For a half mile along White Street, the trail will use the existing West End Trail. TRANSIT UPDATE

Planning for transit on the Atlanta BeltLine corridor and the extension of the Downtown Atlanta Streetcar is progressing. Atlanta BeltLine, Inc. (ABI) has started the technical studies that evaluate the potential impacts of the first extensions of the streetcar lines. These detailed evaluations will consider a variety of possible impacts. With the community's input, we are in the process of narrowing down the route options for three corridors: "Atlanta BeltLine East", "Atlanta BeltLine West", and "The North Ave/ Luckie Street" lines. Once this initial "high level" evaluation is completed, we will formally enter into the much more detailed studies that will inform the Environmental Assessment for all three corridors.

To date, we've met with the study groups to discuss the process the community should expect during these technical studies. A Citywide Conversation was held in June to give the public an opportunity to review these routes on larger maps and discuss and give feedback on alignments with our technical staff.

We will consider your input as we narrow the feasible options down to a more manageable set of options to evaluate in more detail during the environmental assessment process. For an update on this transit process, please visit http://bit.ly/1mSJWse.
